From the front wrapper, we learn that Free, from Wheatley, Arkansas, was the author of *A Popular Geography, Marriage and Divorce, History and Civil Government, and Citizens' Manual*.

Barrett & Co's, S. H. "Roan Charger" In *the Bandit King*. St. Louis. Great Western Printing Co., Pr., Eng. & Lith., 1880s. 3 pictorial promotional cards. Colored.

These three cards promote the melo-drama "The Bandit King." Roan Charger is a horse. One card features Roan tearing down a reward poster for Jesse James with the reward being \$10,000. Another shows Roan picking up his master's hat. On the verso notes: "TONIGHT! See the Most Intensely Realistic, Sensational and Equestrian Melo-drama ever Written. SEE 'ROAN CHARGER' IN. . ." We imagine these were given away before the performance.

First edition of this issue. Lillie, better known as Pawnee Bill, was a school teacher, town founder, banker and best known as owner of Pawnee Bill's Historic Wild West Show. This pamphlet covers his life story and was probably distributed at his Wild West Shows. One interesting fact of his story was his involvement in settling in Oklahoma Territory. "We organized the Consolidated Oklahoma Colonies. I was elected their chief. This organization became known as the 'Oklahoma Boomers.'" He describes moving into the territory and the problems faced by the settlers. "Lieutenant Elliott and the Seventh United States cavalry, had instructions to arrest me and my council on sight. They were also told to stop all Boomers who might enter Oklahoma against the wishes of the cattle men." This issue not in Adams *Herd* but see entries 1331 and 1332. Pawnee Bill's Pony Club is promoted in this issue. Probably printed in Topeka as there is an ad for Arthur Capper's company on the back wrapper.

Howes P179. Voyage to California and the Northwest Coast, 1824-8; second trip 1839, with an account of the country, efforts in behalf of the Monterey prisoners, interview with Webster in 1842 on the necessity of “acquiring” the country, the gold discovery, etc. Bancroft in his Pioneer index, states that Peirce was the oldest living pioneer, and that none had a more varied experience. Presentation, or the translator’s own, copy of the fourth edition (following the original 1865 publication) of Riggs’s translation into the Santee dialect of Dakota, the first complete New Testament printed in that language. Riggs, a missionary who acquired extensive knowledge of the Siouan languages, served as an advocate for the Native Americans imprisoned after the Sioux uprising of 1862, in addition to publishing numerous primers and other books in Dakota. Approximately one-third are 12 1/4” x 15 1/2” folio broadsides with caption-titles and quadruple columns [all as issued]. Dates range from January 20, 1886, through January 4, 1887.

This is an early Dun enterprise. In 1859 R.G. Dun became the sole proprietor of The Mercantile Agency, which had commenced business under Lewis Tappan in 1841; Dun changed the name to R.G. Dun & Co. It merged in 1933 with the Bradstreet Company, and became Dun & Bradstreet. These sheets disclose the financial and business changes undergone by small businesses in the West and Midwest, particularly Colorado, Iowa, Missouri, Wyoming, Nebraska, Arkansas, Dakota, Montana, Texas, Kansas. The information provided is useful to creditors, speculators, investors, and businesses; and includes dissolutions, sales, deaths and retirements, mortgages and liens, damage by fire, and other significant changes.

“...This sheet is a strictly confidential communication, and is furnished at a price agreed upon to our yearly Subscribers only, at their own request, and for their own guidance and protection in business. It is not to be shown, nor its contents made known to any other person, but it is subject in all respects to the provisions of this contract...” An ephemeral precursor to the sophisticated credit reporting services that are indispensable in today’s economy.

Compilation of materials on the efforts to build a bulkhead, or sea wall, in San Francisco harbor. Said to be necessary for the future prosperity of California, discusses need to bring basic supplies by ship, for the mining camps.

Published with "the sympathy and hearty cooperation of the Grand Officers of both the Native Sons and the Native Daughters of the Golden West," this is an ambitious combination of a mug book, with portraits of many leading men and women, and an elaborate promotional for California. Includes sections on California wines and on the leading counties and cities of the state.

Stratton, R.B. *Captivity of the Oatman Girls, being an Interesting Narrative of Life among the Apache and Mojave Indians, containing also an Interesting Account of the Massacre of the Oatman Family by the Apache Indians in 1851; the Narrow Escape of Lorenzo D. Oatman; the Capture of Olive A. and Mary A. Oatman; the Death of Starvation of the Latter; the Five Years of Suffering and Captivity of Olive A. The Oatmans left Illinois in 1849 as part of a Mormon settlement company headed for the confluence of the Gila and Colorado rivers. The party was attacked by Apaches in Arizona who killed six members of the family, leaving a young son for dead and making captives of the two youngest daughters. Mary died in two years; the other of his sisters and the "rescue" of Olive Oatman are well-chronicled. She was extensively tattooed, and went on tour to describe her experiences and display her decorations. The published account that Olive died in an insane asylum twenty years after the publication of this book is untrue. Married in 1865, she moved to Sherman, Texas and lived until 1903.

A section on the establishment and history of the school is followed by an interesting "character of the institution," i.e. dos and don'ts. "Do be punctual. Do not receive calls on the Sabbath. Do not wear expensive clothing and jewelry." Toothache? "Dr. Clyde Payne spends one day a week at the college...."

The ferocious Rejon the Ranchero from northern Mexico turns out to have had an American father from Texas who wooed an Aztec princess...but no more; we don’t want to spoil the exciting plot for you.

Arenal and Manuel David; a lengthy report on naval actions of Admiral David Porter who had left the U.S. Navy to serve the Mexican Navy against the Spaniards; two brief reports from Texas. *Repertorio Mexicano* was the short-lived official periodical of the Mexican government during the years 1827-1828.

A fine run of a "journal of literature and art for women, initially a semi-monthly, from 1859 on a monthly. It aimed to bring culture to ladies by discussing literary classics, by providing information about niceties of

housekeeping, and through the printing of colored fashion plates, is main attraction. Contributors included 'Caxton' (W.H. Rhodes), J.S. Hittell, Frank Soule, and "Yellow Bird" (John Rollin Ridge). Continued (1863-64) as *Pacific Monthly*, it attempted to appeal to men also and ran a series of recollections by such pioneers as Larkin and Lassen" – Hart, *A companion to California* p. 184. This periodical is an early example of a magazine published by women for women. Mrs. Day, both founder and editor, employed such artists as the Nahl brothers and A. J. Grayson, often referred to as the Audubon of the West. Of herself we know but little, though from her forum, "Editor's Table," she seems to have had a keen mind, lively wit and interest in furthering women's rights. In addition to the patterns and costumes were stands on capital punishment and anti-slavery.

Pratt named the work after Joseph Smith, "the great Seer," and in the prospectus promises to explain Celestial Marriage, plurality of wives and other "doctrines, views, practices, and expectations of the Saints who now flourish in the Mountain Territory, and who will flourish over the whole Earth." The work contains much important historical data on the Mormons, with interesting reports on the progress of the sect in Utah. Publication ceased at the command of Brigham Young, and when the contents were considered by the Twelve, the whole work was banned, condemned and suppressed. Flake 7610. Crawley and Flake *Mormon Fifty* 40: "Most of *The Seer* is devoted to Orson Pratt's treatment of certain doctrinal questions, some of which had not previously been dealt with in print. His long serial articles 'Pre-existence of Man' and 'Celestial Marriage,' for example, go far beyond any earlier discussion of these subjects.

Mayhew, Henry Grady.

"The Story of My Life." 1913-1918. Typed, five vols. (311pp.).

Mayhew records the life of a young, rural Texan, commencing while midway through the ninth grade. Mayhew lives just outside Levita, Coryell County, Texas, on his parents' farm. Mayhew's detailed entries record his school days, Methodist Sunday school, preaching, and church activities, hard work, raising wheat, cotton, stock, and odd jobs, including stints as a grave digger. He also relates his troubles with his girlfriend, Beatrice Miles, or rather troubles with her parents, who, as Baptists, object to the attentions he shows their daughter. Nonetheless, they marry in 1916. This is an engaging picture of day-to-day life in rural Texas at the beginning of the 20th-century, written with candor, an eye for detail, and self-deprecating humor.
