Cuney was of Negro, Indian, and Swiss decent. In 1867 the family settled in Galveston. Cuney was active in Republican politics and an active business leader. He tells of the Negro prosecutions in Fort Bend in 1888; the "lily whites," the color bar, the National Convention of 1896, etc. President Harrison appointed him collector of the port of Galveston in 1889.

From the collection of Guy Benton Johnson, a former Kenan Professor in sociology and anthropology at the University of North Carolina, where he was a member of the faculty for 45 years. Johnson was born in Caddo Mills, Texas, in 1901. He received a B.A. from Baylor University in 1921 and an M.A. from the University of Chicago one year later. He earned a Ph.D. from UNC in 1927, three years after joining the faculty. Johnson was known nationally for his efforts to improve race relations in the South. During the 1920s, Johnson studied black culture, including folk music and dialect. The copy bears intriguing annotations (in Johnson's hand?), the most notable of which is "The sex life of an African [crossed out] slave girl."

First published in 1669. One of the most important agricultural writers of the 17<sup>th</sup>-century, Worlidge lived in Petersfield, Hampshire. Engraved frontispiece, with poetical “Explanation.”

Twenty-eight lines of verse, in which we learn, “I was raised among the Indians, I have worked upon the trail, / I have shot the shaggy buffalo, I have heard the coyote’s wail.” No other copies recorded. “Montana Harry” claims to have survived an Indian massacre in 1853, during which his parents were killed and he was rescued by “Texas Jack.” According to his biographical note at the foot of this song-sheet, Montana Harry was “thirty years Government Scout, and Interpreter, exempt from taxation, not allowed to vote, pay no postage on my mail. Sweet Water Reservation, Big Timber, Montana.”

A popular ready-reckoner on the plains: a 17<sup>th</sup> edition was printed in Dallas in 1883. If all the preceding editions were printed in Texas, Morrow's work was a confirmed local phenomenon. The *Brown County Banner* was established in 1875 and merged with the *Brownwood Bulletin* in 1897, making a pre-1897 imprint date likely. Morrow copyrighted his work in 1872, 1874, and 1883. Unrecorded elsewhere, and among the earliest imprints from Brownwood.

A scarce relic from the optimistic early days of one of the last attempts to build a mainstream U.S. auto company from scratch. Despite high-quality autos and innovative marketing (one model sold through the Sears catalogue), the undercapitalized K-F didn't last through the early 1950s. An ephemeral record of postwar industrial culture, touching indirectly on labor and race relations, postwar housing (there is much on the planning and construction of the company town, Westwillow), celebrity endorsements (Oliver Hardy and an Esquire Girl are two) and, as might be guessed from the headline "Beautiful Women Choose Beautiful Automobiles," the occasional dose of cheesecake culled from the K-F work force.
