### History and Development

As a private, comprehensive university enriched by its United Methodist Heritage and partnership with the Dallas-Fort Worth area, Southern Methodist University seeks to enhance the intellectual, cultural, technological, ethical, and social development of a diverse student body. SMU offers undergraduate programs centered on the liberal arts and excellent graduate, professional, and continuing education programs. The SMU experience also includes accessible faculty in small classes and abundant opportunities for research experience, international study, leadership development, and service and internship opportunities beyond campus – all with the goal of preparing students to become contributing citizens and leaders for our state, nation, and world.

SMU comprises six degree-granting schools: Cox School of Business, Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences, Meadows School of the Arts, School of Engineering, Dedman School of Law, and Perkins School of Theology.

Founded in 1911 by what is now The United Methodist Church, SMU is nonsectarian in its teaching and committed to academic freedom and open inquiry. Owned by the South Central Jurisdiction of The United Methodist Church, SMU is managed by a Board of Trustees that includes civic, business, education, and religious leaders who represent various faiths and geographic areas.
