Residence Hall Security...

Security in the Residence Halls

Safety and security begins with YOU! Residents and their guests are responsible for knowing, understanding, and upholding University regulations regarding building security and fire safety, in addition to all federal, state, and local laws and regulations. Violations of any policy may result in disciplinary action and/or removal from the residence hall.

Building Security

The outside doors of the residence halls are locked 24 hours a day. Residents gain access to their hall by using their student ID card. Suspicious persons should be reported to a hall staff member or to SMU Police (214-768-3388 or 911). Some common sense expectations that promote a safer environment for all residents include:

- Do not prop open exterior doors, and please unprop any that are found propped open. If you know who propped the door open, report it to hall staff.
- Do not disable the lock or latching mechanism of any door (interior or exterior).
- Do not loan your SMU ID or room key to anyone.
- Keep your room (or suite) door closed and locked. When you close the door, check to be sure it latches and locks securely. Do not use anything to prevent the door from latching!
- Close and lock windows when leaving, especially for ground floor or first floor windows.
- Do not remove, prop open or disable your window screen.
- Do not permit access to a residence hall by any non-residents. Ask any un-escorted person who is not a resident of the hall to leave the building immediately and report the incident to hall staff.



Emergency Exits

Each residence hall has several designated emergency exits which are to be used for emergencies only. Students using these doors for non-emergency purposes will be subject to a fine and possible disciplinary action. Any student who knowingly tampers with the lock mechanism or alarm on an emergency exit will be subject to a fine, restitution and repair costs, and possible removal from the residence hall.

Liability and Renter's Insurance

All residents are strongly urged to obtain a "renter's" insurance policy for their belongings. Residents should check with their family's insurance provider to see how their homeowner's policy might cover property while attending college. The University does not insure student property, and is not liable for losses or damage to property for any reason, including theft, fire, smoke, vandalism, water or other causes.

Other Safety Information:

- Window screens are not to be removed from the window and must not be propped.
- Nothing may be dropped, thrown or otherwise discharged from a window.
- Antennas, clothing, flower pots and the like may not be placed on window sills and may not extend outside the building.
- Roofs are restricted areas and are off-limits to residents, with the exception of fire alarm evacuation and emergency situations. Other restricted areas include, but are not limited to: attics, porch roofs, machine rooms and elevator control rooms.
- Hallways, stairs, exits and other passageways must be kept clear at all times. Do not put trash, furnishings, debris, trash cans or other items in the hallway.
- Do not tamper with elevators.
- Skate boarding on railings or any other structure attached to a building is not permitted.
- Learn your building evacuation plan.



Minimizing your risk for sexual assault...

Suggestions for Men and Women

- Communicate your expectations and allow your partner to do the same.
- Make conscious decisions - don't leave things to chance, particularly in the area of dating, sex, and alcohol. Set limits that are right for you.
- Make smart decisions - recognize that while the use of alcohol lowers inhibition and SEEMS to make social situations better, it impairs your judgment and reduces your ability to make choices that are good for you.
- Use alcohol responsibly.

Respect Limits

Men: If a woman gives you verbal or non-verbal messages that she does not want sex, don't persist. Take NO as NO. If you are getting mixed signals, ask her what she wants. Don't buy into the myth that an intoxicated woman is asking for sex.

Women: Communicate clearly and make sure the message you send is the one you intend. If you mean "yes" say so; if you mean "no", make it count. Trust your feelings and act on them. If you feel pressured then you are being pressured.

Resolve to

- Drink only from unopened cans, bottles, or drinks that you've seen poured.
- Never, NEVER leave your drink unattended.
- Avoid punch or drinks from containers passed around.

REMEMBER THAT CONSENT IS NECESSARY

A sexual assault is being committed if you have sex with a person who is intoxicated, under the influence of drugs or unconscious and not able to give consent or to resist.

Rape & Sexual Assault...

WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE RAPED OR SEXUALLY ASSAULTED

GO TO A SAFE PLACE

And tell someone such as a trusted advisor or friend, your RA or Hall Director and/or call SMU's Office of Psychological Services for Women at 214-768-4795 for free and confidential counseling.

REPORT THE ASSAULT

It is YOUR decision, but reporting a sexual assault to the police or University officials does not initiate criminal charges. Please call 911 to access the police in your area. If you live on campus, you will reach the SMU Police Department.

SEEK MEDICAL ATTENTION

You could be injured, become pregnant or exposed to a sexually transmitted infection. A medical examination will preserve important evidence of a sexual assault should you decide to prosecute. *Please DO NOT bathe or douche* until after your hospital exam. Currently, Parkland Hospital is the only Dallas County medical facility that can conduct an exam that can be used as evidence. The police will accompany you there and ensure that you get home.

OBTAIN COUNSELING

You may have a trained counselor from SMU accompany you to the hospital (or meet you there) by calling 214-768-4795 or after 5:00 P.M. call the emergency number given in the voice mail. Or after your arrival, the Parkland Hospital staff will contact the Crisis Support Center for you if you wish.

Date-Rape Drugs...

What is a date-rape drug?

Roofies, rope, roaches, liquid X, cherry meth, and rohypnol. These are just some of the names of a dangerous group of substances known as "date-rape drugs." They are colorless, odorless, and nearly tasteless. GHB, or Gamma Hydroxybutyrate, is a powerful drug that has a depressant effect on the body. Effects of GHB can be felt within 15 minutes and are often accompanied by nausea and dizziness. GHB is sometimes used by predators to drug, rape or rob their victims. Victims often have little or no memory of the events preceding the assault. High doses of GHB, especially when mixed with other depressant drugs such as alcohol, may result in respiratory depression, coma and death.

How Can I Protect Myself?

- Never accept a drink from someone you don't know.
- Always open your own drink.
- If you leave your drink for any reason, throw it away and get a fresh one. You don't know who may have tampered with your drink while you were away.
- Always go out with friends, and don't leave friends behind. Stay together and look out for each other.
- If something tastes unusual, do not drink it.
- If you think you have been drugged, immediately go to a friend, security guard, bartender, etc. and ask them to call 911. Do not dispose of the drink - the police may be able to test it for the presence of GHB or other drugs.
- If someone in your group of friends seems confused, dizzy or disproportionately intoxicated in relation to the amount of alcohol they consumed, they may have been drugged. Seek help immediately.
- If you think you may have been sexually assaulted, call the SMU Police (911 on campus or 214-768-3333 from off campus).

Stalking...

What is stalking?

Stalking is a course of conduct directed at a specific individual that is experienced as unwelcome, intrusive or frightening. Stalkers establish a pattern of intimidation by making harassing phone calls, waiting for victims at places, following victims, sending repeated emails or letters, or watching their victims from afar. Sometimes stalkers may destroy property or commit violent acts.

This doesn't happen at college, does it?

Yes, it does. In fact, 13.1% of college women report being stalked in a single academic year. Men are also victims of stalkers, although not as frequently as women.

Who are the stalkers?

Most of the time, the stalker is someone you already know. Among college women who had been stalked, 80% of them knew their perpetrator and 40% of them said the stalker was a current or ex-boyfriend.

What should I do?

Be sure to keep a detailed log of all the harassing behaviors. Let the professionals at SMU help you! Contact Dr. Cathey Soutter, Coordinator of Psychological Services for Women, at (214) 768-4795. Report this problem to the SMU Police at (214) 768-3333. Don't forget that you are not alone!



SMU AWARE

We encourage you to be aware of your surroundings:

- Report any suspicious activity by calling 911 immediately
- Never walk, jog or run alone, and avoid deserted areas
- Always have your keys ready to unlock the door to your car or home, then lock the door
- Never leave belongings in plain view in your car - lock them in the trunk
- Register, engrave, mark, and photograph all your valuables
- Avoid using ATMs in dark, isolated areas, and never flash your cash
- Be responsible with alcohol - if you are intoxicated, you are less alert and an easier target
- In residence halls, be aware of suspicious persons and activities
- Never leave your door open - always lock doors and windows
- If you observe someone or something suspicious, notify the hall staff and SMU Police at 214-768-3333

Relationship Checklist...

(Developed by the National Coalition Against Domestic Violence)

Does your partner . . .

- ___ Embarrass or make fun of you in front of your friends or family?
- ___ Put down your accomplishments or goals?
- ___ Make you feel like you are unable to make decisions?
- ___ Use intimidation or threats to gain compliance?
- ___ Tell you that you are nothing without him or her?
- ___ Treat you roughly - grab, push, pinch, or hit you?
- ___ Call you several times a night or show up to make sure you are where you said you would be?
- ___ Use drugs or alcohol as an excuse for saying hurtful things or abusing you?
- ___ Blame you for how he/she feels or acts?
- ___ Pressure you sexually for things you aren't ready for?
- ___ Make you feel like there is "no way out" of the relationship?
- ___ Prevent you from doing things you want, like spending time with your friends or family?
- ___ Try to keep you from leaving after a fight or leave you somewhere after a fight to "teach you a lesson"?

If you notice these things happening, you could be experiencing relationship violence. You could be in danger of emotional distress and/or physical harm.

TX Laws Concerning Underage Drinking...

If you are under 21, it is illegal for you to purchase, attempt to purchase, possess or consume alcohol. It is also against the law to misrepresent your age to try to obtain alcohol.

If you are a minor, here is what can happen the first time you are found in possession of alcohol:

- 30-day driver's license suspension
- up to a \$500 fine
- 8 to 12 hours of community service
- mandatory attendance in alcohol awareness classes

A second or third offense can lead to suspension of your driver's license for 60 to 180 days. If you're 17 or older, you can also be fined as much as \$2,000 and go to jail for up to 180 days for a third offense.

If you are under 21, it is illegal for you to drive with any detectable amount of alcohol in your system.

If you are under 21, here is what can happen the first time you are stopped for drinking and driving:

- 60-day driver's license suspension
- up to a \$500 fine
- 20 to 40 hours of community service
- mandatory attendance in alcohol-awareness classes

Get caught drinking and driving a second or third time, and the penalties increase, including up to 180 days in jail.

If you are 17 and over, here is what can happen if you are stopped for drinking and driving with a blood alcohol concentration of .08 or greater:

- up to \$2,000 fine
- 72 hours to 180 days in jail
- driver's license suspension of 90 days to one year

Additionally, students accused of violating Texas laws concerning alcohol will be referred to the SMU Student Conduct & Community Standards Affairs Office for possible violation of the Student Code of Conduct. See the Student Code of Conduct in the SMU Student Handbook or view it online at www.smu.edu/studentlife/.

When Driving...

1. Have your keys in your hand before you reach your vehicle.
2. Check the interior of your vehicle before entering it.
3. Plan your route in advance and try to travel well-lit streets.
4. Keep doors locked and windows rolled up.
5. If you have a flat tire in a questionable area, drive on it until you reach a well-lit area.
6. If you believe you are being followed, **DO NOT DRIVE HOME**. Stay on busy streets and seek assistance at any police station or active public building.
7. When parking your vehicle at night, select a well-lit spot.
8. Never fall asleep on public transportation.



Personal Security...

1. Try to use the "buddy system" when walking.
2. Walk confidently and assertively.
3. Travel on well-lit streets whenever possible.
4. Purses and backpacks should be carried securely to the body.
5. Walk facing traffic when possible.
6. Be alert and aware of your surroundings.
7. Do not walk, drive or bicycle while listening to earphones.
8. Consuming alcohol impairs your judgment and increases your chances of being a crime victim. Criminals look for the easiest and weakest target.
9. Guard against fraud and theft. Never give a stranger money or allow them in your vehicle or room. Con artists often use scams to get your money or other property. Call police immediately.

Bicycles & Vehicle Registration...

Security tips for protecting your bike

- 1 Register your bike with SMU Police.
- 2 Use secured McElvany Bike storage. Go to south area desk at McElvaney Hall to pay for your "secured" protected space.
- 3 Be alert for juveniles within the campus. Bikes are often stolen by juveniles.
- 4 Use a bike lock. Kryptonite U-shaped locks are recommended.
- 5 Secure the bike to the rack by placing the U-Lock through the front wheel and the bike frame.
- 6 Know your serial number and engrave your driver's license number into the frame.



Report any suspicious person or activity to SMU Police.

VEHICLE REGISTRATION

When on the phone...

NUISANCE & OBSCENE TELEPHONE CALLS

The following material will provide you with some ideas on dealing with a "crank caller." First, do not panic when the phone rings, because it may just be a wrong number.

If it is a crank call, follow these suggestions:

- If there is no response to your greeting or as soon as you hear an obscenity or improper question... HANG UP.
- Don't play detective. Don't extend the call trying to figure out who is calling. This is the type of reaction the caller wants and needs.
- Don't try to be clever. A witty response may be interpreted as encouragement.
- Don't try to play counselor. The caller needs professional help.
- Don't let the caller know that you are upset or angry.
- Don't tell everyone (except the SMU Police) about your calls. Many calls are actually made by friends, family members, even your closest boyfriend or girlfriend.
- Don't talk to strangers. Be careful when the caller says he or she is taking a survey. If you have any concern about the legitimacy of the call, obtain the caller's name, business name and phone number. Say that you will call back after you verify the authenticity of the survey.
- Never volunteer your name to an unknown caller.
- Place ads with caution. Use a post office box for replies. If you must use your phone number, don't list your address. Crank callers are avid readers of the classified ads.
- Report obscene or annoying calls to the University Police. Make a record of all crank calls.

Fire...

It is important to be aware that your senses (i.e. sight, sound, smell, and touch) will be adversely affected in a smoke-filled building.



Sight: Electricity will be shut down. Darkness will be inevitable. Plan your escape via the stairwell only. Elevators can trap you.

Sound: Loud sirens will affect your ability to think clearly. Force yourself to stay calm.

Smell: Black smoke and gases will make it difficult to breathe. Air is cleaner near the floor. Get down and crawl to safety.

Touch: Doors may be hot to the touch. If so, **DO NOT OPEN!** Find another way out.

By reviewing or memorizing the escape route in advance, you will increase the chance for a safe escape.

UNIVERSITY BUILDING TIPS FOR EVACUATION--

- Know the location of the fire exits and alarm boxes near you.
- Sound the alarm if you see smoke or detect a burning odor.
- Take personal belongings (i.e. purse, keys, etc.)
- Close, but **DO NOT LOCK**, all doors behind you as you leave.
- Use exit stairs, **NEVER ELEVATORS**.
- Have prepared evacuation plan showing escape routes.
- Ask the building manager for such routes.

IF YOU BECOME TRAPPED--

- **THINK.** Do Not Panic. **Call 911.**
- Crawl if you are caught in smoke.
- Hold your breath and close your eyes when you can.
- Put closed doors between you and the smoke.
- Seal cracks around doors/vents with wet towels or rugs.
- Shut off fans and air conditioners.
- Signal for help from a window.

FALSE FIRE ALARM

Activating a fire alarm when you know that there is no fire is a serious crime. The guilty party can receive up to one year in jail and/or a fine not to exceed \$2,000. False alarms waste time, money, and most importantly, can cost human lives.

FIRE EXTINGUISHER USE

P-A-S-S. This is a term that has been developed to assist the operator of a fire extinguisher for proper use.

P = Pull

Pull the pin. Some units require the releasing of a locked latch by pressing a puncture lever or other motion.

A = Aim

Aim the extinguisher nozzle hose at the base of the fire.

S = Squeeze

Squeeze or press the handle.

S = Sweep

Sweep from side to side at the base of the fire until it goes out. Be sure to notify either building or Residence Life & Student Housing (RLSH) staff that the extinguisher was used so it may be properly recharged.



Comprehensive fire extinguisher training is available through the SMU Fire Safety office located in the Risk Management area of the Dawson Service Center.

IN RESIDENCE HALLS & CAMPUS HOUSING

At Southern Methodist University, Residence Life and Student Housing (RLSH) works closely with Risk Management and the University Park Fire Marshal to educate residents about fire prevention. Numerous methods are used to communicate the information students need to know. All students residing in campus housing are expected to know and follow fire safety regulations to better ensure the safety of the entire residential community.

Emergency Notifications...



SMU will send emergency notifications that ask you to take action. Such emergency notification may reach you by city sirens, police vehicle speakers, public address systems, bullhorns, text messages, phone calls, building managers or other means.. The nature of the threat will dictate which modes are used.

Lockdown: Means there is an active shooter or other violence taking place on campus. If you cannot safely evacuate:

- Barricade or lock doors.
- Turn out the lights, close window blinds.
- Get down on the floor, spread out from others, stay away from windows.
- Wait for "all clear" by police or campus officials..



Suspicious Actions/People. Report. Report suspicious activities, people, packages, backpacks, or vehicles by calling 911.



Shelter-in-Place: Called for because conditions outside are a threat to your personal security or health. Examples: severe weather (extreme hail, tornado) or a nearby chemical spill or gaseous release.

Evacuation: A building evacuation may be called for because of fire, explosion, hazardous substance contamination, or gaseous release inside or near the building.

Evacuation Actions: Evacuate the building immediately and report to the external assembly area for that building (given in your class syllabus).



Fire: Call 911. Immediately evacuate the building; help the disabled exit the building. Go to the mass assembly area so a head-count can be taken and first responders will know if anyone might still be inside the building.

Severe Weather...



Remain Inside. SMU can experience a wide variety of severe weather conditions: severe thunderstorms, heavy rainfall (floods), lightning, hail, high winds, tornadoes, extreme heat/cold, sleet, freezing rain (ice storm) and snow.

Tornado Warning: Outdoor sirens will sound. When you hear the sirens, *immediately* seek shelter on the lowest level of the nearest building (preferably a basement), in the interior rooms or hallways, away from all glass/windows. If you cannot reach a basement, use interior rooms or hallways, away from all glass/windows.



University Closings Due To Inclement Weather: If conditions warrant (particularly during the winter months), a decision will be made through consultation between the SMU Police, the President and the Office of Public Affairs. The Office of News & Media Relations will contact the media if classes must be cancelled or delayed. A message will be sent to all campus voicemail boxes which may be accessed by calling 214-SMU-MAIL (768-6245). Announcements and updates may also be obtained by calling 214-SMU-INFO (214-768-4636) or by visiting the SMU web site (www.smu.edu).

Please do not call the SMU Police Department for closing information.

Power Outage: Call; Turn off; Move, Tune in. Severe weather can often cause a power loss. Call 214-768-3494 to report it. Avoid surge damage: unplug computers and other sensitive equipment. Move to an area with power and climate control. Stay tuned in to news stations.

The Southern Methodist University Police Department prepares and distributes an annual security report for the SMU main campus, the SMU-in-Legacy campus and the SMU-in-Taos campus in accordance with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act. These reports, published annually by October 1, contain three (3) years worth of crime, arrest, and disciplinary referral statistics and outline security policy statements including sexual assault policies. The statistics include incidents occurring on campus, public areas adjacent to campus, and certain non-campus facilities including fraternity and sorority housing and remote classrooms. The statistics are also gathered from the City of University Park, Highland Park Department of Public Safety, Dallas Police Department, Plano Police Department, Taos County Sheriff's Office in New Mexico and other University/College officials who have significant responsibility for student and campus activities (including but not limited to directors, deans, department heads, designated RLSH Staff, student affairs, advisors to students/student organizations, and athletic coaches).

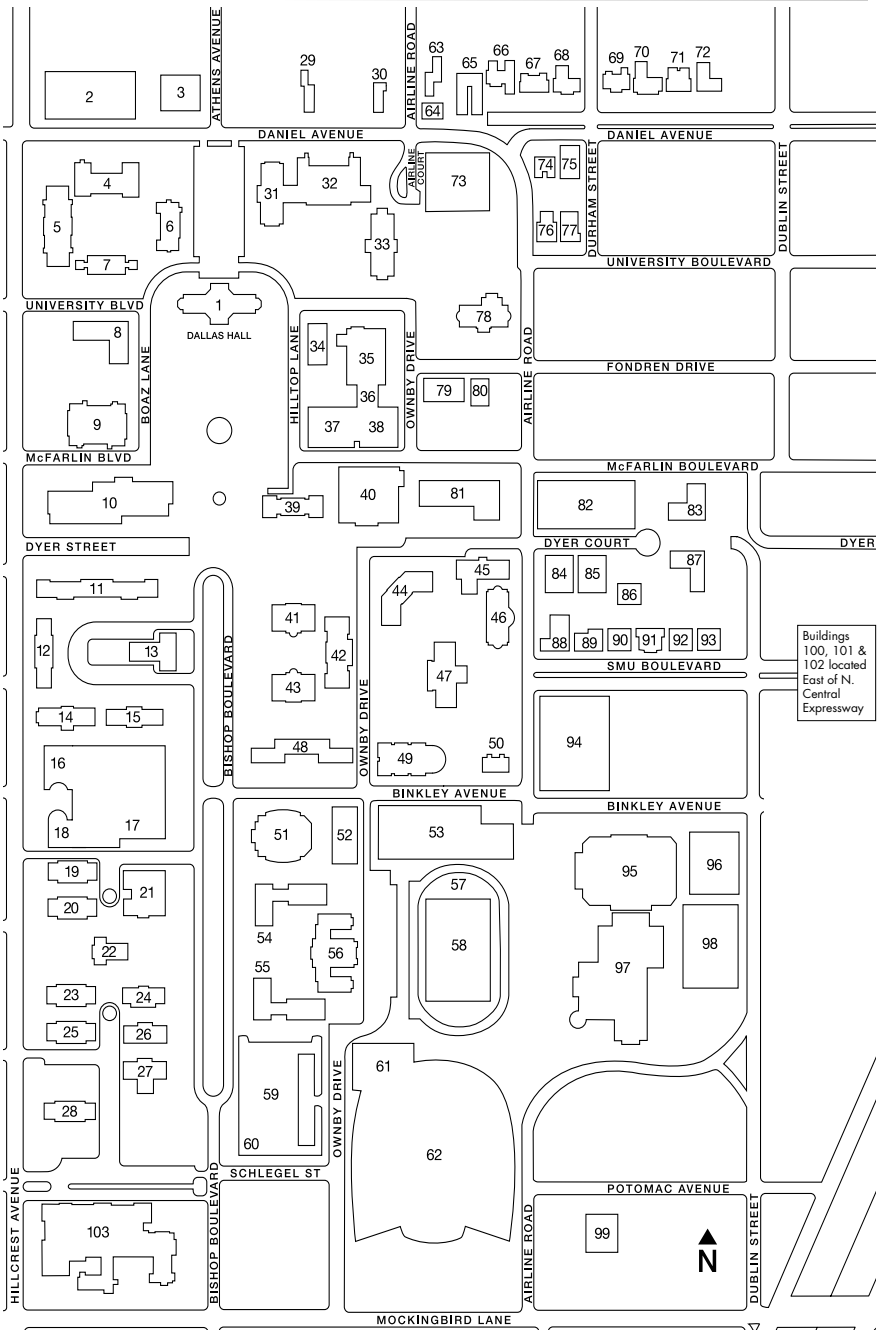
