

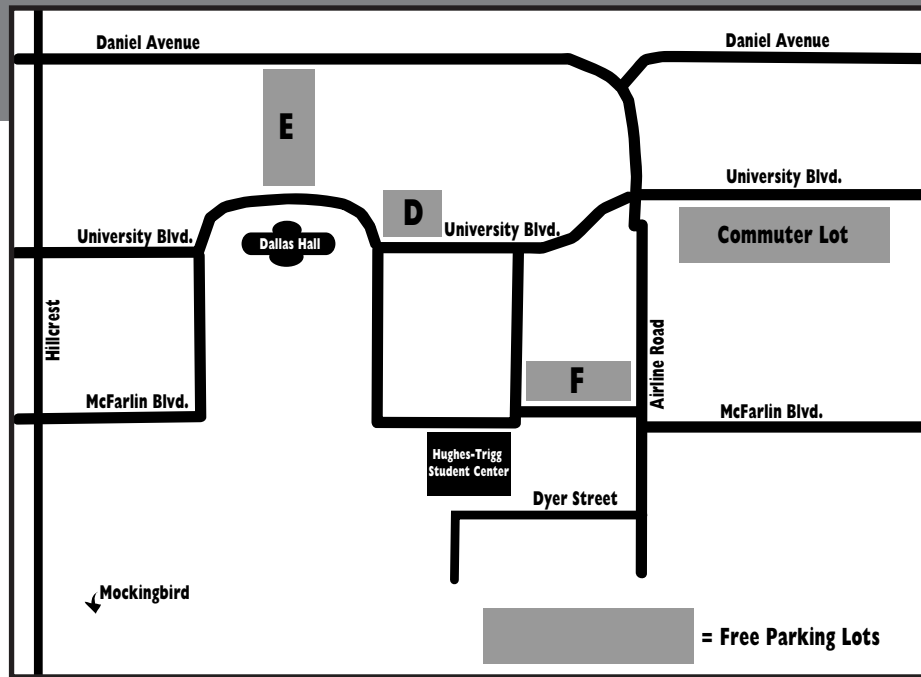
Conference Site

Southern Methodist University was founded in 1911, and its campus on a hilltop in what soon became University Park opened for classes in 1915. The first building, Dallas Hall, housed classrooms, administrative offices, the library, a barber shop, and student center. The citizens of Dallas contributed most of the money to construct the building, which was named in their honor. Its design was inspired by Thomas Jefferson's rotunda at the University of Virginia.

Funds to construct the Hughes-Trigg Student Center were contributed by a couple who met as students at SMU in the 1920s. The *Legacies* Dallas History Conference will take place on the lower level of the Student Center, located at 3140 Dyer. The building is fully handicapped-accessible.

Free parking will be available in **Lots D** (near Dedman Life Science), **E** (just north of Dallas Hall), and **F** (just east of the libraries, entry from Airline), as well as the large **Commuter Lot** on University opposite Sorority Park. For detailed maps, please go to www.smu.edu/maps.

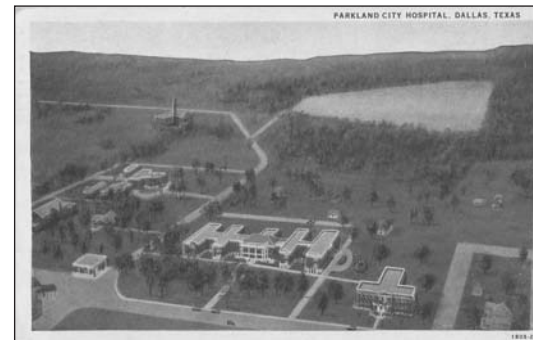
