

Students, Faculty, and Staff competed in the traditional Wesley Cup Kickball Tournament on the SMU soccer fields. Even John Wesley was there!










Students enjoyed Community Lunch in the Refectory as a place to meet with friends and have delicious lunches by Chef David Crow.



The Perkins community celebrated Sending Forth Service in Perkins Chapel and then enjoyed community lunch on the lawn prepared by Chef David Crow.









Course Offering Early American Defenses of a Woman's Right to Preach OT 8351: Major Motifs of Biblical Theology

Tuesdays during the Fall semester 2:00 - 4:50 pm

Discover the inventive ways in which women bucked the trend and defended their right to preach in early America—women such as Deborah Peirce, who composed her defense within forty years of the close of the American Revolution, famed abolitionist Sarah Grimké, Harriet Livermore, who preached three times in Congress, Antoinette Brown, the first ordained woman in the United States, and famed holiness preacher Phoebe Palmer. This unprecedented interdisciplinary course, taught by historian Priscilla Pope-Levison and biblical scholar Jack Levison, will explore how these women interpreted scripture, from Genesis 1:26-28 to 1 Timothy 2:8-15, in creative ways to support their conviction that women should preach.

This course illuminates a pivotal era in the history of biblical interpretation and American freedom of thought, when women combined a high regard for the inspiration of the Bible with newfound tenets of the liberty of the conscience. This would prove to be a peculiarly American phenomenon, reflecting the fresh breath of revolution, a burgeoning interest in the Bible, and the limits that hounded women. You will discover in these treatises riveting insight into how Americans interpreted—and continue to interpret—the Bible to defend a woman's right to preach.
