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BOISE STATE'S JEANTY WINS 2024 DOAK WALKER AWARD

Four-time national running back of the week has led Broncos to Mountain West title, berth in College Football Playoff

DALLAS (SMU) – The **PwC SMU Athletic Forum** is proud to announce Boise State junior running back **Ashton Jeanty** as the winner of the 2024 Doak Walker Award. The announcement came during *The Home Depot College Football Awards* on ESPN.

The formal presentation of the award will take place in Dallas at the annual banquet scheduled for Jan. 31, 2025. The PwC Doak Walker Legends Award will also be presented at the event.

Jeanty, Boise State's first Doak Walker Award winner, has rewritten his school and conference record books this season and is on the cusp of college football history. The Mountain West Offensive Most Valuable Player has 2,497 rushing yards, the fourth-highest single-season total in FBS history and within reach of Barry Sanders' 1988 record mark of 2,628 single-season yards with at least one more game to play. Four times this season, Jeanty was chosen the the Doak Walker National Running Back of the Week.

His 344 carries leads the nation and have outpaced the totals of 115 FBS teams and has led the Broncos into the College Football Playoff for the first time. No. 3 seed Boise State will host winner between Penn State and SMU in the quarterfinals at the Vrbo Fiesta Bowl on Dec. 31.

Jeanty, a 5-9 junior from Jacksonville, Fla., who played in high school nearby at Lone Star High School in Frisco, Texas, was selected from two other outstanding finalists, Omarion Hampton of North Carolina and Kaleb Johnson of Iowa. Playing a 13th game – Boise State beat UNLV 21-7 last weekend in the MW Championship Game with Jeanty rushing for 205 yards – and with five games of 200-plus rush yards has pushed Jeanty 837 yards ahead of second-place Hampton on the NCAA's rushing yards list and almost 960 yards ahead of Johnson.

Riding in large part on Jeanty's rushing success and that of Boise State's offensive line, the Broncos are in the top five nationally of multiple offensive categories. Jeanty has scored 29 rushing touchdowns – equaling or besting the total of 118 FBS teams – and his 7.3 yards per carry leads the FBS among players with 160-plus rushing attempts. He also leads the nation in all-purpose yards (2,613), total touchdowns (30) and points (180). His Pro Football Focus rushing grade is 97.5, the highest single-season mark during the College Football Playoff era (since 2014).

The dynamic back is known for signature breakaway touchdowns and much as his yardage has come in bunches. Lots of them. Jeanty has 12 rushes of 50-plus yards and 10 of 60-plus yards. Of his 364 touches, 121 have gained first downs. Per Boise State statistics, Jeanty has gained 1,889 yards after contact – more than any other FBS player's season total – to log an FBS single-season record. He has five rushing touchdowns of 70-plus yards, tying 2000 Doak Walker Award winner LaDainian Tomlinson of TCU (from 1999) for the most in FBS single-season history since 1996. Jeanty is the first player since at least 1996 to eclipse 125 rushing yards in 13 straight games.

Boise State won back-to-back MW championships for the first time and has an 11-game win streak as it enters the postseason as the CFP's No. 3 seed in Spencer Danielson's first full season as head coach. Danielson was named a finalist for the Football Writers Association's Eddie Robinson Award earlier this week.

Jeanty join's BYU's Luke Staley (2001) as just the second Mountain West player to win this award. He is also a finalist for the Heisman Trophy, which will announce its winner Saturday.

The Doak Walker Award presented by the PwC SMU Athletic Forum has been awarded to the nation's top running back since 1990.


