**ANTH 3313 SOUTH AMERICA: CULTURE, ENVIRONMENT, HISTORY.** This course surveys Indigenous and post-colonial perspectives on South America with a specific focus on the peoples and cultures of the Amazon. Students will draw on a combination of archaeological, historical, and ethnographic evidence to examine the co-production and transformation of South American peoples and environments over time. Topics will include the social organization and political economy of Pre-Columbian societies, continuities and discontinuities with colonial patterns of labor exploitation and socio-ecological change, and the role of politics and economics in framing regional social dynamics today.
