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Reports

Reports are sent out to parents and guardians each term for all students in the University. Students may receive their reports instead of to their parents, if they request this in writing.

Reports. About the middle of November, the May, and the first of May reports are sent out showing work of a grade lower than C.

Continuance in the University

A student who fails to pass at least six term-hours in a term, or a student registered for less than nine term-hours who fails to pass at least six term-hours in any term, or a student who fails to pass at least nine term-hours in a term will not be permitted to register for the succeeding term unless the dean of the school and the faculty are satisfied that the failure was due to unavoidable absences. In either case, the student may be recommended for readmission on probation for a specified period. If the student is marked as failing in any week, the student to be fully reinstated if marked as failing within the period.

Student Representatives

Any student eligible to represent the University in any public exercise, or to act in any representative capacity for any organization, the student must have passed on at least six term-hours the immediately preceding term, must be in good standing or not less than twelve term-hours, and must be in at least one of the following grades in at least ten term-hours.

Absence from Class

Regular attendance upon all class exercises is required. No student should absent himself from classes on any day unless on account of real necessity. Should a student miss more than one-fourth of the regular exercises of any class during a term, he will be required to take a reinstatement test covering the work missed during the absence. Students representing the University out of the city will not be required to take a reinstatement test until their absences exceed one-eighth of the regular exercises of any term.

Should a student be absent from a class exercise, the student must be secured by the dean of the school concerned and presented to the

instructor as soon as possible after the excess of absences occurs. The instructor will promptly give a test and report the results to the dean's office and record the grade as an integral part of the student's record for the term. A student who has been reinstated by test after an excess of absences will be placed upon probation unless the absences are due to justifiable cause. Students who are thus put on probation must account to the dean of the school concerned for every absence following the reinstatement.

Students who fail to take an announced test will not be allowed to take such test at a later date, unless they present to the instructor a written permit from the dean of the school concerned showing that the cause of the absence was necessary and legitimate.

Chapel and Church Attendance

All students, except those excused by the proper authorities, are required to attend the chapel exercises. Excuses will be granted only for good reasons. Unexcused absences will be penalized and continued violation of this regulation will result in suspension.

The University encourages in every possible way regular attendance at church. Each student is allowed to attend the church of his choice, under certain regulations. All boarding students are required to attend church once on Sunday. Boarding students below junior rank, living on and near the campus, must attend the Highland Park Methodist Church at least once on Sunday, except such students as are adherents of a non-evangelical faith.

Conduct

It is the purpose of the University authorities to maintain a high standard both of scholarship and of character. Students who will not work are not desired, and immoral conduct will not be tolerated. A student whose conduct or influence is found to be detrimental to the best interests of the student body may be requested to withdraw; in cases of flagrant misconduct or continued violation of rules and regulations, the penalty will be suspension or expulsion.

The faculty invites the hearty co-operation of the Student Association in the maintenance of high standards and as far as practicable will rely upon student sentiment and student self-government for the enforcement of good conduct. All the actions of this Association are subject to review by the Com-

mittee on Discipline appointed by the general faculty and no student will be suspended or expelled without the vote of the general faculty.

All forms of hazing are positively prohibited and students on entrance are required to sign a pledge to refrain from the practice; but rushes and other contests conducted under the immediate control of the Student Association, in accordance with rules approved by the faculty, will be recognized and encouraged.

Boarding Restrictions

All women students are required to live in the dormitories, except those who reside with near relatives. Exception may also be made in the case of mature women who are pursuing special advanced work. Of men students, *all freshmen under twenty years of age* are required to live in the dormitories, except those who reside with near relatives. Exception may also be made in the case of those who desire to work for their board.

Health

All new students are subject to a physical examination by one of the University physicians. These physicians have also general care of the health of all students boarding in University Park. Dr. Mimmie L. Maffett resides in the Woman's Building; Dr. Jeuel Daughety resides in Rankin Hall.

All students are urged to take advantage of opportunities for physical exercise. As soon as proper facilities are available, under-graduate students will be required to do a specified amount of work in physical training.

Student Activities

Extra-curricular activities of the student body are encouraged by the University, though no credit towards a degree is allowed for such work. Two committees have been created by the general faculty to keep in touch with all student enterprises and to promote in every legitimate way the healthy development of all organizations that encourage profitable activities among the students. The Committee on Athletics has supervision over all athletic organizations and affairs; the Committee on Student Activities has general oversight over all other student organizations and activities. No organization should plan a trip or a function without first consulting the chairman of the committee concerned.
